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
#### The Budget for 2023-24



- Funding in 2023-24 is about £1.5 billion higher than set out in May 2022's Resource Spending Review (RSR)
  - Additional UK government funding and higher forecast tax revenues

### Change to funding in 2023-24 between RSR and Budget







#### The Budget for 2023-24



- Funding in 2023-24 is about £1.5 billion higher than set out in May 2022's Resource Spending Review (RSR)
  - Additional UK government funding and higher forecast tax revenues
  - Higher than previously expected inflation will eat into this increase
- Nearly all areas of spending will increase relative to their initial 2022-23 Budgets
  - Big change compared to RSR last May

#### The Budget for 2023-24

- Funding in 2023-24 is about £1.5 billion higher than set out in May 2022's Resource Spending Review (RSR)
- Nearly all areas of spending will increase relative to their initial 2022-23 Budgets
- After accounting for in-year top-ups to Budgets this year, plans imply a real-terms reduction in overall non-benefit spending


#### The medium-term outlook

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 Funding is set to be higher than previously projected over the next four years – but still lower in 2027 than 2022

### Funding is set to fall further in 2024-25 IIIFS and still be below today's levels in 2027

Real-terms resource funding (2022–23 = 100), non-benefit spending





#### The medium-term outlook

- Funding is set to be higher than previously projected over the next four years – but still lower in 2027 than 2022
  - Assumes improved income tax position (uncertain)
  - But deliberately cautious on available UK government funding
  - Funding for teachers' pay less impact on medium-term outlook
- Prioritising health and 'net zero and transport' as in 2023-24
  Budget would require very difficult choices for other services

## The bigger the increases to priority areas like health and 'net zero' the bigger the cuts to other services


#### Local government funding

- Scottish councils' funding was cut by less than English councils' during the 2010s
  - Biggest beneficiary of this was spending on school and early-years childcare, where by 2021-22 spending per pupil was 25% (£1,700) higher than in England, up from 4% in in 2009-10
  - Spending on social care also increased, but spending on most other services fell by over a quarter during 2010s
- Outlook for Scottish councils' funding over the next two years tougher than for English councils

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Projected Scottish council funding from grants and council tax, real-terms



### ... extra funding for pay may mean small increase in 2023-24... BUT...

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
Projected Scottish council funding from grants and council tax, real-terms

#### Local government funding

- Scottish councils' funding was cut by less than English councils' during the 2010s
- Looking ahead, Scottish councils likely to see real-terms cuts to funding, while English councils will see a boost
  - Boosting schools spending will mean bigger cuts to council services that often bore the brunt of 2010s cuts
  - Each additional 1% for schools and early-years childcare means almost 1% less for other services

#### **Summary**



- The Scottish Government's Budget faces short, medium, and long-run challenges
  - 2023-24 is currently set to see a cut in non-benefit spending
  - Funding for non-benefit spending projected to be lower in 2027 than in 2022
  - The long-term 'Barnett squeeze'
- Local government funding is set to be squeezed while it rises in England – at least partially reversing trends in the 2010s
- 2023-24 Budget and medium-term projections are based on an improvement in tax revenue performance – uncertain

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
