Motivation




- Increasing levels of wealth held by those at older ages alongside stagnant average earnings for those of working age
 - Inherited wealth is growing relative to incomes
 - But inheritances will be received progressively later in life
- Transfers made during life worthy of particular focus
 - May be becoming more common, larger, or more consequential
 - Possible that they are given in response to events or needs in the life of the giver or receiver
 - Relatively little known about who gives/receives and why
- We examine new data from the Wealth and Assets Survey (2006-20)
 - Covers gifts and loans of £500 or more, given and received

Gift receipt has become slightly more prevalent in recent years

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Percentage of adults reporting receipt of at least one transfer over the



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Proportion of adults reporting receiving/giving at least one transfer over the last two years, by age category



Proportion of gift value, by relation of giver to receiver



Cumulative transfer receipt by income quintile (over 8 years)



Cumulative transfer receipt by income quintile (over 8 years)



Cumulative transfer receipt by parents' socioeconomic status (over 8 years)





There are substantial differences in gift receipt by ethnicity

Summary



- Wealth transfers made during life are primarily a flow of gifts from parents to their adult children while they are in early adulthood.
- These transfers increase inequalities in economic resources.
 - Overall effect is modest but not negligible.
- They expand the gaps between those with rich and poor parents.
 - Half of transfers are given by the wealthiest fifth.
- There are large differences in gift receipt between ethnic groups.
 - Pakistani, Bangladeshi, Black Caribbean and Black African young adults much less likely to receive than white young adults.

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
